However, it does not necessarily mean that old spices should always be discarded. Adding heat can transform the product, enhancing its smell and taste. Often the pantry is filled with old dry mustard powder and paprika of doubtful age and origin. And while you may think that it is time to turn it into compost, think again! They might still have some uses around the house. For attires and books, sachets full of old spice give off their smell over time. For example, spices like cinnamon trick the mind into thinking that it is warmer than it actually is. Similarly, for summer clothes, try dried mint, coriander, or other spices that taste 'cool' to you. One can also throw the sachets in with stinky clothes

decoration, and can remain fragrant for a surprisingly long time. They can also be used as colouring agents. One can mix together one cup of flour, 1.25 cups of cold water, and a tablespoon of neutral oil until it's thick enough to paint with. These paints are children-friendly and have a good aroma as well. Some spices, like turmeric, can also be used as dye.



India is responsible for 70% of the global spice production. The majority of people in the world have some sort of spice in their home from India!

In the 4th century bc, black pepper had immense value. The Greeks referred to it has 'black gold'. At this time about 120 ships a year full of spices were consumed by Romans.

 Most historians and scholars agree that Portugal was the first country to discover India. It is said that Vasco de Gama reached India in 1492. He started importing spices from India and would encounter pirates when going back to Portugal. There was a time when spices were more valuable than gold.

• Salt has been produced in India for over 5000 years. During the time of the Spice Route many Roman soldiers were paid their salaries in Salt! This gave birth to the term 'salary'. The phrase 'worth his salt' was also derived from the same context.

• During the 18 Century and after America had established itself as a strong independent country its citizens started dealing directly with Indian farmers in order to bring spices to the west.

• Malaysian and Indonesian food have deep roots in Indian cooking. During the spice route, Indian merchants travelled to these countries and introduced these spices. This accounts for the similarities in many South East Asian dishes.

When the Arabs took control over Kerala, India during the 6th century BC, they took over the major channel of the spice route. Arab traders kept the profit margin high when selling to their own people and would make up stories about how they got them to deter others from going to India. Legend as it that some Arab merchants told their own citizens that they travelled through jungles and encountered winged creatures and poisonous snakes that they had to fight off in order to get spices.

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
